MINUTES

I. Call to Order

The regular meeting of the Merced City and County Continuum of Care (CoC) was called to order at 11:05am on February 2, 2023 via Microsoft Teams by Matt Serratto.

II. Roll Call

IV. Public Comment

No comment was made.

V. Consent Agenda Items

Approval needed for this meeting's agenda and December 1, 2022 minutes. Motion from Steve Tietjen, second from Ray Reyna. None opposed. Motion passed unanimously at 11:10am.

VI. Disaster Response Update

Christy McCammond shared there are 41 families at the Planada Migrant Center which is scheduled to close February 28, 2023. HSA is presently working on assessment and transition plan for remaining families at Migrant Center. A Disaster Operations Center has been established at HSA; Disaster Response Centers were set up at the Fairgrounds and Planada community area. The evacuee shelter at Fairgrounds is now closed. A robust assessment will be taking place at the migrant center today through partnership with Catholic Charities. An emphasis has been placed on determining what resources families have now, what we can do to ensure they are safe, whether they can return to their homes if habitable, or find a transition point for them if not. HSA has been strongly encouraging survivors to

register with FEMA as soon as possible.

Maribel shares there has been a conscious, community-wide effort to properly help those experiencing homelessness prior to the start of the flooding. The temporary evacuation point wasn't equipped with specialty services so HSA has worked closely with the Navigation Center, Distributive Housing, and the D Street Shelter to find creative solutions to help those who are currently homeless and affected by the floods.

VII. Community Projects

A. Merced Navigation Center

Jennifer Carr stated the Navigation Center is currently operating at full capacity with 84 people and thirteen dogs. Maribel Baron added that capacity is currently higher due to the recent flooding emergency. The Navigation Center was able to find space to add eight additional cots for individuals affected by the flood. As part of the recovery phase, HSA will be speaking with the Navigation Center and Merced County Community Action Agency (MCCAA) to determine the effect this is having on their operations budget. At this time there is no confirmed end date for the eight additional cots. Further, there is currently no additional funding for them right now so the Navigation Center and MCCAA is managing this out of their own existing funding and staffing.

B. Emergency Housing Vouchers

No update given.

C. Los Banos Non-Congregate Shelter – Final Update

Luke Brown shared the Los Banos Project Roomkey was funded through ESGCV in partnership with the City of Los Banos. It was designed mostly for the rooms contracted at the La Plaza Inn. This project was designed for individuals to have their own rooms to help prevent the spread of COVID in the community. Within two hours of project launch day, the entire hotel was filled. Total clients served in this project was 57. Upon successful ID restoration, 36 of these individuals were able to obtain employment. With help from Golden Valley, 39 were linked to healthcare services. Through partnership with BHRS, 17 individuals were linked to behavioral health services. Twelve individuals were successfully linked to Veterans Affairs. Thirty-three pets were linked to proper veterinary care. In total, 31 clients received housing. This success was highly attributed to working very closely with many other community providers and pursued family reunification.

D. Distributive Housing

David Carr stated Los Banos is currently full with all nineteen beds taken. Merced currently has three beds open, twenty-two are taken.

E. Homeless Court

Christy McCammond shared the court application remains the same and she is still the contact until further notice. One application has come through from Turning Point. The Homeless Oversight Committee meets on a regular basis, which John Ceccoli would be able to speak to. Currently looking for a replacement Homeless Court Navigator as the previous one was through a grant. The return of a Court Navigator will enable a more robust outreach effort regarding the Homeless Court Initiative.

F. Housing Update

Christy McCammond started off with a recap of the 95-unit Homekey Project at 1213 V Street. The lead service provider for this project is MCCAA. Of the 95 units, 45 units must meet HUD Housing Quality Standards (HQS) to be eligible for a voucher. We are working on securing project-based vouchers but will likely be Housing Choice Vouchers, HUD VASH vouchers, or Emergency Housing Vouchers. The other 50 units are habitability standards. According to Housing and Community

Development, these habitability standards are a little less complicated and a little more accessible than HQS HUD standards.

It will take some time to bring all 95 units to the HUD standard. The time frame for all construction to be completed is June 28, 2023. The required time frame to be 100% leased is September 28, 2023 with a 10% vacancy rate leeway.

Christy shared she has begun examining how people are placed into units, understand who can live there, how does one qualify to live there, and what must be done to keep them living there. Christy also stated she is working hard to understand who all of the involved stakeholders are and what requirements, criteria, and documentation are needed from all levels (HUD, State, local). This project will flow through CES, as is mandated. It will look like a CES referral to the Homekey Project if the client is connected with a community partner. The community provider will then begin the application and document process. If no community provider is on record, MCCAA and the CalAIM and ECM community supports will be used to guide the client through documentation and application review. The rental application will then be reviewed by project managers and hopefully approved. The 20-unit Homekey Project for Veterans is next in line for project management.

VIII. Chair Comments

- Reminder: Point in Time Count taking place on February 23rd, encouraged all present to register by contacting Phil Schmauss.
- Gratitude expressed to all those involved in navigating through the disaster relief.
- Many have expressed concern over the disbanding of DART. This was an operational decision based on staffing levels that no one came to lightly, but is hopeful this is will be restored in the future.

IX. Action Items

A. CoC General Membership Applications – General Membership Vote

Three applications from Agape Community Transitional Services Foundation, Livingston Community Health, and The Dr. Jennifer M. Jones Foundation were proposed for approval to join the CoC General Membership. No comments or concerns were shared by any in attendance. Motion from Josh Pedrozo, second from Jennifer Mockus. None opposed. Motion passed unanimously at 11:38am.

B. HHAP Round 1 Funding – Board Vote

The Collaborative Applicant Administrative Entity requested the use of up to \$1,000 of system support for landlord engagement, promotion, and informational items specifically for a Homeless Connect event. This event will include local agencies, organizations, and vendors providing services and supplies to those experiencing homelessness throughout the County. Additional services such as case management, rapid rehousing, and more will be on site to connect and register individuals experiencing homelessness. No money will be exchanged with landlords, this money will simply be used to secure a space to conduct the outreach event. Motion from Josh Pedrozo, second from Steve Roussos. None opposed. Motion passed unanimously at 11:46am.

X. Board Information & Possible New Action Items

None at this time.

XI. Reports

A. CA Information Report Out

- The Collaborative Applicant received Gary Brizee's resignation from CoC Board, effective December 12, 2022.
- The 2023 PIT Count was extended due to the recent flooding disaster and state of emergency. Following HUD approval and consultation with Phil Schmauss, the event was pushed to February 23, 2023.

- CoC Committees are expected to begin re-engaging and report back to the CoC on a quarterly basis in the near future. Presently established committees are dedicated to CES, Health, HMIS, Planning and Development, Sustainability, Youth, and Faith. At this moment, the CoC is not asking for volunteers but an email will be sent out to Board Members and the entire General Membership with more information. The CoC will facilitate the formation of the committees and offer directional guidance.
- Per Interim Rule, the CoC must hold annual public invites to our membership. To remain compliant, we have been attending the first hour of recent City of Merced Town Hall meetings (1/25/23, 1/31/23) to present an overview of the CoC's work and facilitate membership from the public. The next town hall is scheduled for February 9th.
- The CoC has also participated in recent CDBG meetings to provide information about the CoC, talk with local nonprofits who are applying for CDBG funds through the City to give an idea of other nonprofits in the area. These engagements have brought about an increase in membership applications with more expected to come.
- The CoC applied for a HHAP 4 Allocation and received approval. The HHAP 4 funding allocation amount awarded to the Merced City and County CoC is \$1,136,537. The CoC is working with our fiscal department to determine present status of projects and develop a fiscal plan for the next one, three, and five years.

B. Prioritization Update

The last prioritization adoption took place in September of 2021, during which the Board approved five sub-priority groups within the homeless population. It was discussed that the CoC would bring this back to the Board annually but it was not doable in 2022. The prioritization update will be brought back to the General Membership and the Board for a new approval which aligns with today's landscape.

XII. CoC General Membership Comments

- Josh Pedrozo shared information regarding a Town Hall at the Cesar Chavez Middle School in Planada from 6pm to 8pm that evening. County representatives and staff will be there to provide information and resources to those affected by the flood. Information can also be found on the County website.
- Gloria Sandoval suggested sending outreach to the Merced Smart & Final as there are frequently individuals who appear to be homeless around there. Jennifer Carr said she will send out their Outreach Team to that area.

XIII. Adjournment

This meeting was adjourned at 12:09pm. The next CoC meeting is scheduled for Thursday, March 2, 2023 at 11:00am.
