### **MINUTES**

### I. Call to Order

### V. Consent Agenda Items

Approval is sought for the May 4, 2023, meeting's agenda, and minutes.

Stephen Hammond seconded. Non opposed.

Motion passed unanimously at 11:13 am.

### VI. Community Projects

### A. Merced Navigation Center

**Jennifer Carr:** Currently at full capacity with 76 participants and 12 dogs. 727 participants since opening and housed 65 individuals.

### B. Emergency Housing Vouchers

**Jesenia Aguilar:** Currently housed 51 clients with vouchers. 3 vouchers pending approval/denial. 4 vouchers are pending with other agencies. 3 vouchers pending to be picked up by another agency. 7 vouchers are out in the community looking for housing.

### C. Distributive Housing

**David Carr**: Distributive housing served 311 clients, permanently housed 45. For the City of Merced, have two beds open. For the City of Los Banos, it is at full capacity.

### D. Homeless Court

David Carr: Graduation was last month, July 2023, with 10 graduates.

### E. Housing Developments

**Maribel Baron:** 1213 V St. project is moving along. The project received capital funding from BHRS that allowed them to finish up the remaining units. Now all units will be housing quality standards once opened, slated to open late October of this year, with the leasing beginning shortly right after. Individuals have already begun to be identified. Community Action Agency is working with the providers and the communities to get these individuals document ready. The first intakes may begin August 7<sup>th</sup> to start the process of leasing for this property.

Three Home Key applications were submitted on July 27<sup>th</sup>. Shangri-La Development submitted a Home Key round 3 application for 80 units at the Motel 6 on Child's Avenue. 915 Custom Container submitted their application for 57 units on East Child Ave. The Tiny Homes project and City of Los Banos submitted their applications for 60 units. Congratulations for everyone.

### VII. Chair Comments

**Matthew Serrato**: From 2022 to 2023 Point in Time Count had an 8% overall drop in homelessness in Merced County compared statewide there was an 8% increase. Once these Home Key projects start, we have an opportunity to drive down that even further. We have a long way, but it is encouraging to show that we got a lot of good people doing good work on it and to congratulate everyone for their hard work and big projects coming.

#### VIII. Action Items

### A. **CoC General Membership Applications** – General Membership Vote

Two applications from Second Chance for Women and Fresh Start Recovery Program. Both are postponed to September meeting as there were no quorum for the General Membership.

### B. Board Vote

The CoC requested approval from the CoC Board to approve the following CAIs:

### 1. Establishment of the Outreach Committee

**Collaborative Applicant:** The Collaborative Applicant/Administrative Entity (CA/AE) is requesting to establish the Outreach Committee. Per the Continuum of Care (CoC) Governance Charter 2022, Section 9.1 "Appointment to Committee", the "CoC Board will appoint committees, subcommittees, or working groups when necessary. This committee to facilitate outreach services has been requested by the CoC General Membership. This committee will allow for all organizations that provide outreach services to collaborate and leverage their efforts to maximize services and reduce duplication of efforts.

**Josh Pedrozo:** Want to make sure rules and regulations are being followed as we had one individual holding two committee chairs and this establishment is within ground rules.

**Collaborative Applicant:** We can have multiple individuals be chairs of committees, as long as they can fulfill their requirements of that committee.

Sargeez Teimoorshahi: We discussed this and I believe it was Margaret Simmons who brought up the idea. We have a lot of agencies right now who have outreach workers and we have a lot of resources that we did not previously. If we could coordinate these efforts to have all the average workers work together and assign specific areas in the City of Merced, Atwater, and different jurisdictions, we can make a bigger difference.

**Luke Brown:** How many average teams do we have?

Sargeez Teimoorshahi: There's a lot of different outreach teams as we have different agencies that have outreach workers and there has been some duplication of services. The first step is to determine how many outreach workers we have in which agencies and to meet to determine what the next steps will be.

**Luke Brown**: Once that is determined, can you work with me to make sure all these outreach teams are utilizing HMIS and clarity so we can have them in the system?

Sargeez Teimoorshahi: Yes, absolutely. That's going to be one of the main thing we focus. **Luke Brown**: I appreciate it. Thank you so much.

**Collaborative Applicant:** If the approval of the committee is received today, the Collaborative Applicant will send out a request for volunteers for the committee. Once the committee meets, just like any other committee, the committee will need to then nominate a chair and vice chair that will come back to the board for approval. This will be a CoC committee, so all volunteers are going to be accepted and then will come back to the board to establish the chair and vice chair at that time.

Josh Pedrozo motion to approve. Jennifer Mockus seconded. No opposition. Motion passed unanimously at 11:24am.

### 2. Establishment of the Lived Experience Committee

**Collaborative Applicant:** The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) mandates that a CoC establish a Lived Experience Committee. This Lived Experience Committee will be comprised of individuals with past or current homeless experience who will partner will the community and local organizations to determine how the CoC can best meet the needs of the homeless population. Additionally, by establishing this committee, the Merced CoC will gain CoC Consolidation Application points and will ensure compliance with HUD requirements.

Jennifer Mockus motion to approve. Josh Pedrozo seconded. No opposition. Motion passed unanimously at 11:25am.

B3-B7. **Collaborative Applicant**: We asked to take together the following agenda items as they are the same agenda item for each committee. The Collaborative Applicant will read off the recommendations and then ask for one vote for B2-B7.

Committee nominees are held to the same standards as CoC members. They are expected to carry out the mandate of the CoC to the best of their ability and to maintain the highest standards of integrity for communications and actions with other CoC representatives, the CoC Board, service recipients, service providers, and members of the public. Members are expected to conduct themselves with courtesy and respect, without harassment, physical, or verbal abuse. Personal relationships will not result in special considerations, including bias or favoritism, that influence the performance of their official duties in a manner contrary to the interest of the CoC. Members are expected to exercise adequate accountability over matters for which they are individually responsible.

- A. Collaborative Applicant/Administrative Entity History Presentation Collaborative Applicant shared a Power Point slide on the history of the CoC (see end of Minutes for PowerPoint slides).
- B. Community Outreach & Engagement RFP & 1213 V St. Rapid Rehousing RFP Collaborative Applicant: Taking both B and C together as they both discuss RFP that recently closed. We received one application for the 1213 V St Rapid Rehousing and one application for Community Outreach and Engagement. Both entities have been contacted and are in the middle of contract negotiations. Once contracts are finalized, we will bring them back and let everyone know what the outcomes are and also post to our website.

### C. FY 2023 CoC Consolidation

**Collaborative Applicant:** We hosted our first workshop on July 19<sup>th</sup>. The clarification period has ended and all Q&As has been posted on the website. All responses are due by the end of August 18<sup>th</sup>. We received notification that ESG NOFA will be released on August 15<sup>th</sup>.

### XI. CoC General Membership Comments

Collaborative Applicant: The committees are up and running. The Collaborative Applicant Administrative Entity has been at some of the meetings to facility to help get them up and running. We will no longer continue to attend those meetings as that is a CoC General membership item and we want collaboration between the committee members. Once the members meet, they can submit their recommendations to the Collaborative Applicant. All committee have to meet at least once a quarter. Starting next month, we will ask for a small report out from every committee.

**Dr. Jennifer Jones:** Dr Jennifer Jones with the Legacy Project will be conducting an outreach event at Applegate Park on November 4<sup>th</sup> with Alliance and HSA team at Castle. There will be flyers coming out.

**Josh Pedrozo:** There is a Loaves and Fish village in Austin, Texas that is built as a community first village and what they're doing is they have these miniature houses, RV, and they're printing 3D houses to include more people into their neighborhood.







### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

Each year, the Collaborative Applicant (CA), on behalf of the Merced City and County Continuum of Care (CoC), is required to administer the responsibilities for the annual U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) CoC application competition. On July 5, 2023, the HUD released the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 Continuum of Care Competition and Renewal or Replacement of Youth Homeless Demonstration Program Grants with Merced CoC Annual Renewal Demand (ARD) in the amount of \$767,298.00. The CA launched the Merced CoC Request for Proposal (RFP) on July 21, 2023, with a clarification period from July 21<sup>st</sup> - July 28<sup>th</sup> and a due date of August 18, 2023. The Scoring Committee reviewed, scored and tiered all responses submitted. The CA must provide all ranked responses and scores to the Merced CoC Board for review and approval. All project applications must be submitted prior to September 28, 2023, by 8:00pm EST.
