MINUTES

I. Call to Order

The regular meeting of the Merced City and County Continuum of Care (CoC) was called to order at 11:05am on May 4, 2023 via Microsoft Teams by Matt Serratto.

IV. Public Comment

Gloria Sandoval asked whether the Merced CoC is connected with the California Interagency Council
on Homelessness. Matt Serratto stated the Collaborative Applicant is in constant communication
with the State.

V. Consent Agenda Items

Approval sought for this meeting's agenda and April 6, 2023 minutes. One addition to the "Continuum of Care Board Members in Attendance" section is required to reflect Candice Adam-Medefind's presence at the April 6th meeting. Motion from Steve Hammond 11:14am, second from Steve Tietjen 11:15am. None opposed. Conditional motion passed unanimously at 11:15am.

VI. Community Projects

• Merced Navigation Center

David Carr stated a total of 670 unique individuals have been served to date, 55 of which have been permanently housed. At this time, the Navigation Center is full with 76 participants and 17 dogs.

Emergency Housing Vouchers

Jesenia Aguilar stated 46 individuals have been housed with EHV's. There are 11 unexpired vouchers

in hand. Seven vouchers have been submitted to Housing Authority and are awaiting approval or denial. Four voucher applications are out with agencies now.

• Distributive Housing

David Carr stated a total of 284 unique individuals have been served to date, 39 of which have been permanently housed. In the City of Los Banos, there are 5 beds open, another 5 filled. The City of Merced has 3 beds open, 22 filled.

Homeless Court

David Carr stated that their recently hired Homeless Court Navigator has spent the past month building relationships and trying to find people who fit the Homeless Court criteria.

Housing Developments

John Ceccoli stated there is not much new information to provide as housing developments tend to move slowly. Anticipated opening dates for the City of Merced Project Homekeys are August of this year.

VII. Chair Comments

Matthew Serratto reiterated the massive effort which is being made to filling all the housing units presently in development. There has been a shortage of units for a long time, so there is lots of excitement around these new units dedicated for homeless individuals and much hope that it will make a big impact on the community. Our last Point in Time Count showed a slight uptick in unsheltered this year, but we saw an overall 8% drop, indicating good progress.

- CA has been conducting monitoring for CBOs throughout the month of April. Gratitude was expressed to all organizations who have hosted the CoC on site for monitoring.
- The 2022 HUD Consolidated Debriefing highlighted Merced CoC. The HUD Consolidated Application submitted last year scored high with 158 out of 173 points, specifically scoring very high in Assistant Performance Measurement. Next steps include looking at how we can further improve in areas such as system performance.

XI. CoC General Membership Comments

- Manuel Inacio of the San Joaquin Valley Veterans Westcare has moved to a new building on the
 corner of Olive and R (2995 R Street, Suite 103). The office is presently operational and ready to
 serve homeless veterans and those in danger of being unhoused. The Staff Sergeant Parker Fox
 Suicide Prevention Grant was awarded to SJVV Westcare, allowing them to provide resources
 toward community-based suicide prevention, expanding efforts to meet the needs of veterans and
 their families through outreach, suicide prevention and connection to VA and other community
 resources.
- Lee Greenawalt shared that the Journey for Justice will be meeting on May 8th at the Methodist Church. The Committee on Faith is meeting on June 12th at the Methodist church as well.
- Ray Reyna requested assistance from the group to be connected with the new full-time employee for the Homeless Court. David Carr offered to do so.

RECOMMENDED ACTION(S):

Ratify the appointment of the Director of the Human Services Agency or their designee to continue performing administrative functions as the Merced City and County Continuum of Care's Collaborative Applicant and Administrative Entity.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Since 2018, the Human Services Agency (HSA) has been authorized by the County of Merced's Board of Supervisors to perform administrative functions as the Collaborative Applicant (CA) and Administrative Entity (AE) for the Merced City and County Continuum of Care (CoC). This was initially proposed as an interim solution while a community alternative was sought to operate as the CA/AE, however, the implementation of the Housing and Homeless Services Branch (HHSB) at HSA provides HSA the capacity to maintain the functions of the CA/AE.

In order to apply for United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) project funding, the CoC must designate an eligible entity as the CA. The CA is the only entity that can apply for a grant from HUD on behalf of the CoC and without a designated CA, the CoC is not eligible to receive funding from state and federal sources.

As the AE, HSA has the responsibility to contract and monitor activities and expenditures of all sub-recipients who have been awarded funding through the CoC.

Since 2005, the Merced CoC has received funds from HUD to provide housing services for individuals and families experiencing homelessness. The CA/AE has secured more than \$7.9 million in CoC funding through HUD and the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) which includes:

- \$1,045,611 for California Emergency Solution and Housing (CESH) Round One (1) and \$592,252 for CESH Round Two (2); and
- \$3,101,645 for Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) Rounds One (1) through Four (4); and
- \$3,170,800 for Emergency Solutions Grant-Coronavirus (ESG-CV) Rounds One (1) and Two (2).

Additionally, the CA/AE submitted annual applications as a required function of HUD which includes the Consolidated Application and Emergency Solutions Grant. The application process brings an additional \$801,408 for the CoC jurisdiction. Determination of subrecipients is on-going and the CoC follows a competitive bidding process. The CA/AE is funded through the Merced County Behavioral Health and Recovery Services' Mental Health Services Act, the City of Merced Community Development Block Grant, and the County of Merced.

This designation was approved by the Merced County Board of Supervisors (BOS) on May 9, 2023. Due to the date of approval by the BOS, this item was not available to approval for the May CoC Board date.

RECOMMENDED ACTION(S):

Authorize the Director of the Human Services Agency, acting as the Collaborative Applicant/Administrative Entity for the Merced City and County Continuum of Care, to apply for and accept a grant allocation in an amount up to \$4,000,000.00 for Encampment Resolution Funding Round Two (2) to be used for providing homelessness services within the City of Atwater.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Since 2018, the Board of Supervisors approved the Merced County Human Services Agency (HSA) to act as the Collaborative Applicant/Administrative Entity (CA/AE) for the Merced City and County Continuum of Care (CoC). The CA/AE is the legal entity designated to apply for funding on behalf of the CoC. The CoC is designed to promote a communitywide commitment to the goal of ending homelessness.

The Encampment Resolution Funding (ERF) is a four (4)- year grant program which includes two (2) rounds of funding to provide grants to local jurisdictions and continuums of care to resolve critical encampment concerns and transition individuals experiencing homelessness in encampments into safe and stable housing. ERF Round Two (ERF-2) is intended for the following eligible uses:

- Rapid Rehousing;
- Operating subsidies for new and existing supportive housing units, emergency shelters, and navigation centers;
- Street Outreach;

- Services coordination, which includes case management, access to workforce, education, and training programs or other services to improve and promote housing stability;
- Systems support as necessary to create regional partnerships and a homeless services and housing delivery system;
- Delivery of permanent housing solutions;
- Prevention and shelter diversion services including financial assistance and problemsolving assistance;
- Interim Sheltering;
- Improvements to existing emergency shelters; and
- Administrative costs.


The CA/AE will work alongside the City of Atwater to find solutions for individuals living in encampments and transition them into safe and stable housing. The City of Atwater has provided the CA/AE a letter of acknowledgment in full support of this application by the CoC.

ERF-2 funds must be fifty percent (50%) expended and one hundred percent (100%) obligated by June 30, 2024, and one hundred percent (100%) expended by June 30, 2026.







Investment Plan Overview

The Investment Plan is a required submission for MCPs seeking to participate in HHIP.

Investment Plan Intent

The goal of the Investment Plan is for MCPs to demonstrate their approach on a targeted investment strategy for achieving the HHIP measures and program goals in collaboration with local partners.

Reminder: Use of HHIP Funds

- Participating MCPs will be eligible to earn HHIP payments for the successful completion or achievement of HHIP program milestones and measures.
- Such payments do not constitute prefunding or reimbursement for investments made using MCP funds in pursuit of program milestones and measures.
- Once the HHIP payments are earned by the MCP, DHCS does not direct or restrict the MCP's use of the earned incentive funds.




